



Lorraine "Lorry" Goldenberg

January 31, 1922 - January 14, 2011

Lorraine "Lorry" Goldenberg, age 88, of Huntington, died at 2:22 p.m. Friday (January 14, 2011) at the Parkview Huntington Hospital.

Lorry was born on January 31, 1922, the daughter of Jacob and Fannie (Feldman) Brenn, in Huntington. She graduated as Salutatorian in 1939 from Huntington High School, and went on to receive her Bachelors Degree from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. On June 13, 1944, Lorry married Hy Goldenberg in Huntington, and he preceded her in death on February 9, 2000.

Lorry was a homemaker, loving wife, mother, and grandmother. She was active in several community organizations, including ACRES Inc., Girl Scouts of America (the Limberlost Council), the 10th Mountain Division Veterans Association, and the PTA. Lorry was a member of the Achduth Vesholom Temple of Fort Wayne, Indiana, and an expert weaver and knitter. She and Hy wintered in Zichron Yaavoc, Israel.

She is survived by one son – Sherman (Karen) Goldenberg of Syracuse; two daughters – Zvi (Ellen) Stepak of Ramat Gan, Israel, and William (Nan) Plasterer of Huntington; eight grandchildren, and two great granddaughters. She is preceded in death by her parents, husband, brother – Earl Brenn, and sister – Berenice Schankerman.

Visitation will be Tuesday (January 18, 2011) from 3 to 5 p.m. at the Bailey-Love Mortuary. Memorial services will be held at 5:00 pm. Tuesday (January 18, 2010), at the Bailey-Love Mortuary with Rabbi Javier Cattapan officiating. Burial will be at a later date.

“ About 54 years ago, my mom took me to the Huntington YMCA to sign me up for Brownie Troop #242. I went to a Catholic grade school, and my mom wanted me to get to know girls from other backgrounds in the town. It was my good fortune that the leader of this troop was Mrs. Lorry Goldenberg. (Her daughter, Ellen, is my age.) I wish I could remember a lot of specific incidents, but mostly I just remember having a great deal of respect and liking for Mrs. Goldenberg. She helped us with innumerable craft projects, took us on tours of the “industries” of Huntington, and sought out people with unusual hobbies (like making and firing jewelry in a kiln) and enabled us to share in these. She taught us how to folk dance, which was great fun! I’ll never forget that she took us to “roller skating lessons” for 10 weeks in a row so that we could earn a Girl Scout Roller Skating badge. (I still love roller skating!) She also took us to the state capitol and made it possible for some of us to be pages for a day. But the most important gift that she gave to a small town girl like me was letting us get to know her. We often met in her home on Cherry Street and were mystified with her looms and the fabrics that she had made. We learned from her to take an interest in our community and to use our talents to make it a better place for everyone. The Goldenberg family was the only Jewish family that I personally knew until I was out of college, and they made an indelible positive impression that has greatly influenced my entire life. God bless you, Mrs. Goldenberg, and may you enjoy your heavenly home with your dear husband!
