



Max M. Fordyce

January 7, 1936 - October 1, 2024

Max Marland Fordyce died October 1, in Warren, IN. He was born on January 7, 1936, the son of Cecil and Agnes (Pond) Fordyce. An older brother, Robert, preceded him in death. He is survived by his wife of 66 years, Phyllis (Burkhart) Fordyce.

Max graduated from Huntington High School in 1954. He attended Huntington University and went on to receive a Master's Degree from Ball State University in Science Education. He continued his education largely through the National Science Foundation attending summers at Indiana University, Michigan State, Northwestern, and Notre Dame.

One of the Indiana state finalists for the Challenger "Teacher in Space" program, he loved sharing his interest in all things science and math, first teaching at Clear Creek High School, then by teaching astronomy, chemistry, math, and physics at Huntington North High School for 35 years, retiring in the late 1990's. He was a member of the Huntington County Classroom Teachers and Indiana State Teachers, serving as a leader in both groups over the years. He enjoyed many activities associated with the students including his favorite, the Variety Show, "star parties", high school sports, and many other school related activities. He enjoyed signing with the Chain-O-Lakes barbershop chorus and quartet. He loved sailing his catamaran and fishing at Big Lake. He was a big country and gospel music fan. He volunteered at

United in Love food pantry after retirement. He was a Wabash-Erie canal history interpreter at the Historic Forks of the Wabash, especially enjoying dressing and playing the part to area 4th graders visiting the Forks and sharing his stories with 8th graders in his daughter's history classes. He and Phyllis also traveled the United States extensively, visiting all 50 states. His special hobby was reupholstering furniture. And, of course, he loved his IU basketball!

He lived his faith every day and was a member of Bethel United Methodist Church where they were married on August 3, 1958, and then Trinity Church in Huntington where he taught Sunday School, and was active in many outreach activities of the church in the community.

Max is survived by his loving wife, Phyllis, who stayed by his side until the end. He had three daughters, Cynthia (Edward) Welling of Fort Wayne, Indiana, Pamela (Thad) Perkins of Southport, North Carolina, and Julie (Jerry) Oliver of New Castle, Indiana. He was the proud grandpa to Kimberly (Steve) Hurth, Scott (Stacy) Oliver, Michael Welling, Aaron Perkins, Casey (Andy) Adams, Kathleen Welling, and Abby (Sakshay) Bhatnagar. He also had a nephew, Jesse Fordyce. He also had four great grandchildren.

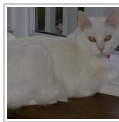

“ My condolences and sympathy go out to the Fordyce family during this time of separation, grief, and loss. While I can't fully grasp what you are going through, I, too, grieve and I would like to share with you a bit of why I feel this way.

Mr. Fordyce began teaching at Clear Creek High School in the fall of my freshman year, so I was blessed to be one of his students in math (and Chemistry) for three wonderful years. He was my favorite teacher at CCHS for a number of reasons. He was tough, enthusiastic, funny, and caring in class and out, and he taught in such a way that he inspired me to want to learn and to master the material. It is no exaggeration to say that he turned my life around and made me love a subject that I had long disliked. When I entered CCHS, I wasn't a very serious student and I didn't much care for math, but somehow after a few weeks in his Algebra I class, I was eager to study and learn the material, not just in his class but in others. I was shocked to find that I understood the math and actually enjoyed it—math was fun! Mr. Fordyce was always easy to talk to and took a personal interest in his students. He even sent me a graduation card although he wasn't at Clear Creek High School for my senior year. I still have that card.

Mr. Fordyce inspired me to major in math in college and set me on a path that included two graduate degrees in mathematics and becoming a math professor at the same college where both he and I graduated. Whenever I was teaching, I tried to follow his example of lively, caring interaction with the students.

I was very fond of him not only while he taught me but during all the years since then. I will miss him greatly. Rest in Peace, Mr. Fordyce; teacher, mentor, and friend.
